## The Root of All Kinds of Evil

## "Suspicion"

(2 Samuel 10)

# Introduction: 1. This past weekend was April 1<sup>st</sup>, and most people know the significance of that day.

- 2. Some people take great pleasure in taking full advantage of "April Fool's Day."
- 3. Many breathe a sigh of relief when April 2<sup>nd</sup> rolls around, but many others never let down their guard and remain suspicious of nearly everyone and everything.
- 4. Such an outlook on life is inconsistent with the teachings of Jesus and detrimental to our own lives.
- 5. As we examine this Old Testament passage, let's examine whether we need to become less suspicious and more trusting.

### I. The Foolishness Of Suspicion

- A. David's act of kindness (2 Samuel 10:1-2).
- B. The Ammonite princes' suspicion (2 Samuel 10:3).
- C. The unkindness of suspicion (2 Samuel 10:4-5).
- D. The cost of suspicion (2 Samuel 10:6-19).

#### II. Lessons Learned About Suspicion

- A. Not everyone has ulterior motives for kindness.
  - 1 Some people actually live by the "golden rule" (Matthew 7:12).
  - 2. David had shown kindness to Mephibosheth (2 Samuel 9) and now wanted to show kindness to the Ammonites over the death of their king (2 Samuel 10).
  - 3. Maybe such suspicion is a reflection of our own character.
- B. Don't judge people's motives.
  - 1. (Matthew 7:1).
  - 2. (1 Corinthians 13:7).
- C. Beware taking sides with people who have suspicious natures.
  - 1. The Syrians lost their freedom for joining sides with the suspicious (2 Samuel 10:18-19).
  - 2. (Proverbs 18:17).
  - 3. (1 Corinthians 15:33).
  - 4. (John 7:24).

### Conclusion:

- 1. Let's stop "reading between the lines" and judging another's motives.
- 2. Instead, let us act in harmony with that which leads to trust, peace, and harmony.
- 3. And when tempted to judge, to draw lines, to choose sides, remember this lesson from 2 Samuel 10.
