- D. Because it is touchy, many have shied away from the topic, and the result has been that there are several shifts that need to be made in our thinking.

## II. StewardShifts That May Need To Be Made

- A. A Shift In What We Give.
  - 1. (2 Corinthians 8:5).
  - 2. God wants us before he wants our money.
  - 3. Investment determines interest.
- B. A Shift in How We Give.
  - 1. (2 Corinthians 9:7).
  - It's not "give till it hurts," but rather "give cheerfully."
  - 3. The Greek word for "cheerful" is "hilaros" from which we get our English word, "hilarious."
- C. A Shift in How Much We Give.
  - 1. "Every little bit helps?" Not so when courageous and bold sacrifice is needed.
  - 2. Sometimes this slogan is a salve to sooth our consciences.
  - 3. (Acts 4:33-37; 1 Corinthians 16:1-2).
- D. A Shift In Whose Money It Is.
  - 1. (Psalm 24:1).
  - 2. Stewardship vs. Ownership.
  - 3. (Matthew 25:14-30).
