Red Letter Living

"Love Your Enemies" (Matthew 5:43-44)

Introduction: 1. Never has a man impacted the world as did Jesus.

- 2. His life and his teachings stand as a testimony to his claim to be the Son of God.
- 3. When Jesus spoke, his words were weighty and authoritative (John 7:32-47; Mark 1:22).
- 4. In most of our Bibles, the words of Jesus have been set apart by being printed in red.
 - a. One is not to conclude that these words are any more important than the other words of the Bible.
- 5. However, for the next few weeks, we are going to examine a few of the "Red Letter" words of the Bible; and take those words off the page and put them into practice.

I. Love Your Enemies

- A. (Matthew 5:43-44).
- B. This statement was made in the middle of the Sermon on the Mount.
- C. This sermon is the longest recorded sermon of Jesus, and surely contains some of the most starling and challenging commands.
- D. There has never been a time when it was easy or popular to love our enemies, but this is what Jesus called us to do.

II. How Do We Love Our Enemies?

- A. Have compassion on your offender (Romans 12:17-21; Matthew 5:44).
- B. Separate the sinner from the sin (Psalm 27:7; Romans 7:17).
- C. Pray for them (1 Thessalonians 5:17).
- D. Go to your offender (Matthew 18:15-17).
- E. Recall times when you, yourself were in the wrong (Romans 2:1).
- F. View it through the eyes of faith.

Conclusion: 1. Do you have enemies? If so, love them!

- 2. It's not optional, it's a command.
- 3. Being a disciple of Jesus is not easy; it's challenging.
- 4. But let's get serious about discipleship and begin living out those "Red Letters."
