- 1. If you're interested in Jesus, you should be interested in the prophets.
- 2. Revelation 19:10 says that the spirit of prophecy is the testimony of Jesus.
- 3. (Luke 24:44) Jesus said that all that had been written of him in the Law, the Psalms, and Prophets must be fulfilled.
- 4. The prophets were great and godly men; men who could not be silenced by bribery or threat.
- 5. (Matthew 16:13-15) What a great compliment to the prophets!

- B. It was written about the city of Nineveh.
- C. It was written approximately 780 B.C., approximately 60 years before the Assyrians conquered Israel.

- A. All Men Accountable to God
 - 1. (Jonah 1:2).
 - Just because the Gentiles did not have the law of Moses doesn't mean they were not accountable to God.
 - 3. Nor does it mean that God did not love them.
- B. We All Run.
 - 1. The guestion is whether we will run with God or run from God.
 - 2. (Jonah 1:3).
 - 3. (Acts 10:5,23).
- C. Sin Isn't Personal or Private.
 - 1. Sin, almost always, involves others.
 - 2. (Jonah 1:12-14).
 - 3. (Romans 14:7).
- D. Preach What God Tells Us to Preach
 - 1. (Jonah 3:2).
 - (Romans 1:16).
- E. Discipline and Repentance Go Hand in Hand.
 - 1. (Jonah 1:17-2:1).
 - 2. Discipline is never pleasant, but it results in good (Hebrews 12:5-11).
- F. Guard Your Attitude.
 - 1. (Jonah 4:1-2).
 - 2. Don't be angry with God's grace (Matthew 20:1-16).
- G. Jonah Prefigures Jesus
