Open Our Eyes

(Matthew 20:29-34)

Introduction: 1. The miracles of Jesus were intended to produce faith in those who witnessed his power.

- 2. (John 20:30-31).
- 3. Not only do these accounts have the power to produce faith, they also contain many contemplative thoughts as well.
- 4. Let's consider one such incident in this lesson.

I. Background

- A. While Jesus was leaving the city of Jericho, a multitude of people were following him.
- B. There were two blind men who heard that Jesus was passing by them.
- C. They cried out to Jesus for mercy, and were told to be silent.
- D. Instead, they cried out all the more, and Jesus took notice.
- E. He asked what they desired, and he gave them their sight.

II. Application

- A. These blind men turned to Jesus for help.
 - 1. (Matthew 20:30).
 - 2. (John 6:68).
 - 3. (Matthew 11:28-30).
- B. These blind men sought the Lord, in spite of opposition.
 - 1. (Matthew 20:31).
 - 2. Can others silence you?
 - 3. (Acts 4:17-18).
 - 4. (Acts 5:28-29).
 - 5. (2 Corinthians 4:13).
- C. These blind men requested that Jesus open their eyes.
 - 1. (Matthew 20:33).
 - 2. Although we may have physical sight, might we need our eyes to be opened?
 - a. Open our eyes to opportunities (Revelation 3:7-8).
 - b. Open our eyes to our blessings (Ephesians 1:3; Psalm 107:8).
 - c. Open our eyes to our future (2 Thessalonians 1:3-12).

Conclusion:

- 1. Maybe we, like those blind men in the days of Jesus, need to be crying out to the Lord, asking him to open our eyes.
- 2. If your eyes are open, and you don't like what you see, then take advantage of this opportunity to make things right.
