- Introduction: 1. We are at the point of beginning a work that will outlive us and which will require unity and sacrifice.
 - 2. Metaphorically speaking, each generation must rise up and build for the next generation.
 - 3. In our case, that is not only metaphorical, but literal.
 - 4. This morning's lesson is intended to encourage you as we are about to engage in this good work.
 - 5. And we want to do that by asking how Nehemiah was so successful when rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem.

I. He Had A Pure Motive

- A. (Nehemiah 1:4,11).
- B. Unlike the motives of the builders of Babel (11:4).
- C. God was at the heart of his desire to build.

II. He Engaged In Quiet Preparation

- A. (Nehemiah 2:11-16).
- B. He examined the situation in advance; made plans before the people knew it.
- C. That's what leadership looks like.

III. He Saw Opportunity In Adversity

- A. (Nehemiah 2:17).
- B. God does some of his greatest work when we are most vulnerable.

IV. "Let Us" - All Were Involved

- A. (Nehemiah 2:17-18).
- B. It wasn't a command, but an invitation.
- C. The people accepted and embraced the challenge.

V. They Faced Opposition

- A. (Nehemiah 2:19).
- B. Their opposition came from without and within (Nehemiah 5:1-13).

VI. They Had A Mind To Work

- A. (Nehemiah 2:20).
- B. (Nehemiah 4:6).
- C. (Nehemiah 6:15).
