I Am Judas

(Luke 22-23)

Introduction: 1. Ills. "I am Sparticus."

- 2. Ills. Article by Matt Walsh.
- 3. When we consider the events leading to the death of Jesus, we are horrified at the treachery and cowardice of everyone around Jesus.
- 4. I want to put distance between me and those people.
- 5. But the more I evaluate the events of that weekend, and the more honest I am with myself, I am more disturbed, not by their actions, but by the way I can relate to each one of them.

I. I Am Judas (Luke 22:1-6)

- A. Have I ever betrayed Jesus?
- B. Have I ever sold him out?
- C. Have I ever plotted against him so that I could have or do what I want?

II. I Am Peter (Luke 22:54-62)

- A. How many times have I denied Jesus, maybe not with words but with my deeds?
- B. How many times have I tried to blend with the world.
- C. How many times have I tried to avoid suffering and sacrifice?

III. I Am Pontus Pilate (Luke 23:13-25)

- A. How many times have I compromised to find middle ground with society?
- B. How many times have I looked on indifferently at injustice?

IV. I Am Herod (Luke 23:6-12)

- A. Have I ever treated Jesus like a magician who can do "tricks" for me?
- B. Have I ever made shallow and selfish petitions that received no answers?

V. I Am Barabbas (Luke 23:18-25)

A. Have I ever failed to realize my indebtedness and show gratitude for what Jesus has done for me?

VI. I Am The Crowd (Luke 23:13:25)

A. Have I ever stood with the crowd rather than alone with Jesus?

VII. I Am The Unrepentant Theif (Luke 23:39-41)

- A. Have I ever wanted rescued from the consequences of my own sins?
- B. Have I ever been bitter toward others when it was I who was responsible?

Conclusion:

- 1. Song "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?"
- 2. "Yes, I was there!" I am the villain in the story. I killed Jesus. It was me. It was because of my sins.
- 3. But thank God, there is yet another character in this story, the penitent thief (Luke 23:39-43).
- 4. I am him too. I, like him, recognize my sinfulness and can only repent in sorrow and ask for grace.
- 5. And because God is who he is, he offers us the terms of his pardon.
- 6. Will you accept those terms?
