I Know God, Or Do I?

(Matthew 25:14-30)

Introduction: 1. Many people are absolutely sure about many things, but are dead wrong.

- 2. With some situations, this mistake doesn't matter, but with other situations, it does.
- 3. When it comes to knowing God, we need to be sure that we truly know him, and have not created a figment of our imagination.
- 4. In this lesson, I want you to consider how well you know God.

I. The Setting for the Lesson

- A. The parable of the talents (Matthew 25:14-30).
- B. Take particular notice of what the one talent man said about the master who represents God in this parable (Matthew 25:24).
- C. Is God a "hard man" with unreasonable expectations of us?
- D. The one-talent man said he was, but was he correct in his assessment of God?
- E. I affirm that he did not know what he thought he knew.
 - 1. The master freely gave (Matthew 25:14).
 - 2. He gave proportionately (Matthew 25:15).
 - 3. He rewarded disproportionately (Matthew 25:21, 23).

II. How Well Do We Know God?

- A. Have we imagined a God who honors relationship over obedience?
 - 1. (2 Chronicles 26).
 - 2. (1 Samuel 15:22).
- B. Have we imagined a God who values works over faith?
 - 1. (Ephesians 2:8-10).
 - 2. We cannot tip the scales in our favor with our good works.
- C. Have we imagined a God who requires perfection over faithfulness?
 - 1. (1 John 1:7).
 - 2. (1 John 2:1).
- Conclusion: 1. What about you? Do you know God as well as you thought you knew him?
 - 2. Whatever you imagined God to be, the reality revealed in God's word is better.
 - 3. May we all abandon what we thought we knew to embrace what we know the word of God reveals.
