Lessons from the Limited Commission

(Luke 10:1-12)

Introduction: 1. For many years it was the tradition in the school of preaching to end chapel service every day with the song, "The Gospel Is For All."

- 2. However, there was a time when God reached out to the Jews first, then to the Gentiles (Romans 1:16).
- 3. Today's lesson is centered around what is called the limited commission, and several lessons we can learn from it.

I. We Should Pray For Laborers

- A. (Luke 10:2).
- B. It's interesting that it was laborers Jesus said to pray for, and not the lost.
- C. Could it be that Jesus knew that "recruiting" laborers might be a greater problem than converting the lost?

II. Evangelism Is Hard Work

- A. (Luke 10:1-3).
- B. Sent out as lambs among wolves (v. 3).
- C. Maybe that's why he sent them out two by two (v. 1).

III. Evangelism Demands Our Support

- A. (Luke 10:4-8).
- B. Jesus expected them to be cared for while on this mission.
- C. (Matthew 10:10) The worker is worthy of his hire.
- D. If we cannot go in "person," we can go in "purse."

IV. We Cannot Allow Rejection To Derail Us

- A. (Luke 10:10-12).
- B. Shake the dust off and move on.
- C. Don't take it personally; they're rejecting God, not you.

Conclusion: 1. For those who reject the the gospel, Jesus said it will be more tolerable in the day of Judgment for Sodom than for them.
