(3 John)

Introduction: 1. 3 John is one of only five "one chapter" books in the Bible.

- 2. It is written to a member of a local church that had some rather serious problems.
- 3. In this third book of John, we are introduced to three men, all of which are worthy of our consideration.
- 4. In this lesson we will examine a few lessons we can learn from these three men.

I. Gaius: A Prosperous Christian

- A. (3 John 1-8).
- B. Four times in this short book, John refers to Gaius as "beloved."
- C. An amazing prayer is offered for Gaius.
 - 1. That your health prospers as your soul (v. 2).
 - 2. What would happen to you if this prayer was answered with regard to your life?
- D. He is rich in his love for the truth and his brethren.

II. Diotrephes: A Proud Christian

- A. (3 John 9-10).
- B. Jesus alone has preeminence in the church (Colossians 1:18).
- C. Diotrephes needed a dose of John the Baptist's attitude (John 3:30).
- D. Most people who desire to lord over a congregation follow a similar strategy.
 - 1. Creep in unawares (Jude4).
 - 2. Flatter people to gain advantage (2 Samuel 15:1-6; Jude 16).
 - 3. They prat against leaders (3 John 10; 1 Timothy 5:19).
- E. God will humble the proud (Matthew 23:12; James 4:6).

III. Demetrius: A Praiseworthy Christian

- A. (2 John 11-12).
- B. Every congregation needs a "Demetrius."
- C. His Christ-likeness is testified to by his brethren and the Word of God, itself.
- D. Is your life such that you could be set forth as an example for others to follow?
- E. Would your brethren be able to recognize you as a godly person?

Conclusion: 1. In this short book, we can see why the church was suffering, and we can also see the solution to their problems.
