Wash One Another's Feet

(John 13:1-17)

Introduction: 1.

- 1. The theme for our congregation this year is "Consider One Another."
- 2. Consequently, I've decided to preach on several "One Another" passages throughout the year.
- 3. Today's lesson is entitled, "Wash One Another's Feet."
- 4. This is a command given by Jesus and if you aren't obeying this command, you need to repent and do what he commands.
- 5. In this lesson, we'll examine what this command means and how we can obey it.

I. The Context

- A. (John 13:1-17).
- B. Sometimes we are asked if we take the Bible "literally."
- C. Better than saying "I take the Bible literally" is "I take the Bible "literarily."
- D. What Jesus was commanding was not the specific action of "foot-washing," but the principle of service that motivates "foot-washing."
 - 1. Ills. Burn the midnight oil.
 - 2. Ills. Roll up the window.
 - 3. Ills. Carbon copy me.
- E. These are all commands that have outlived their specific application.
- F. This is the exact thing that was going on when Jesus commanded us to wash one another's feet.

II. The Meaning

- A. We must serve one another.
- B. (John 13:15).
- C. (Matthew 20:26-28).
- D. Many of us have been blessed throughout our lives by the spirit of service that permeates the church of Christ.
- E. But instead of asking when was the last time someone washed your feet, a better question would be when is the last time you "washed another's feet?"
- F. (1 Peter 4:10; Romans 12:5-8).

Conclusion:

- 1. The point of this lesson is to remind you of this command that Jesus once gave, and it's continued present day application.
- 2. Consider one another! Whose feet can/should you wash?
- We will never look more like Jesus than when we "humble ourselves, kneel before each other with a pitcher and a towel and wash one another's feet."
