Light as Pink

(Isaiah 1:18)

Introduction: 1. We struggle with taking the words of Isaiah at face value.

- 2. Surely, this can't be true... "it's too good to be true."
- 3. However, the forgiveness God offers is real and instead of worrying and being burdened by guilt, we should rejoice in our salvation.
- 4. This morning, I would like to examine a Psalm that reaffirms what the prophet Isaiah said.

I. Background to Psalm 130

- A. Psalm 130 is a "psalm of ascents."
 - 1. This is a title given to fifteen of the Psalms (120-134).
 - 2. These psalms were psalms that were sung by the Jewish pilgrims as they made their ascent to Jerusalem to worship (Deut. 16:16).
- B. They were joyous, brief, and hopeful.

II. An Analysis of Psalm 130

- A. Prayer.
 - 1. (Psalm 130:1-2).
 - 2. When we find ourselves in the "depths," what else can we do but to cry out to the Lord?
 - 3. Consider Peter's words (John 6:68).
- B. Humility.
 - 1. (Psalm 130:3-4).
 - 2. We are wholly inadequate before the Lord.
 - 3. We cannot stand on our own, but we can be rescued.
- C. Relief.
 - 1. (Psalm 130:5-6).
 - 2. God's forgiveness is likened to the dawning of the morning for the night watchmen.
 - 3. It's a time of relief, not worry.
- D. Redemption.
 - 1. (Psalm 130:7-8).
 - 2. Hope in the Lord for with him there is mercy and redemption.
 - 3. Redemption from "all" our iniquities!

Conclusion: 1. Learn to trust God.

- 2. Take him at his word.
- 3. There's no "pink" in Isaiah 1:18.
- 4. The children of God aren't tainted by sin, but rather they wear white garments (Revelation 3:5).
