Sackcloth Underneath

(2 Kings 6:24-31)

Introduction: 1.

- 1. Life is difficult, and God knew it would be.
- 2. That's why he desires the church to be a community of believers who can lean on each other and be strong for each other.
- 3. The following are several practical suggestions that might help us fulfill that mission.

I. The Story of Jehoram

- A. (2 Kings 6:25-31).
- B. Jehoram wasn't a good king (2 Kings 3:1-2).
 - 1. He didn't make the list Hebrews 11.
 - 2. He was son of Ahab but wasn't as wicked as his father and mother.
 - 3. Even after the incident recorded in this chapter, he wanted to kill God's prophet, Elisha.
 - 4. He does, however, serve as a reminder to us.
- C. Jehoram tore his clothes and exposed he was wearing sackcloth underneath.
 - 1. Sackcloth was coarsely woven, often made out of goat's hair.
 - 2. It would be uncomfortable, itch, and irritate, and chafe.
 - 3. It was worn to represent the affliction of the spirit.

II. What Can We Learn From Jehoram

- A. What you see is not always what you get.
 - 1. Many people show only what they want to show and hide a part of their life that is causing them great pain and discomfort.
 - 2. Therefore, be careful how you judge a person.
 - 3. I am constantly mindful of the cheery dispositions we "put on" for each other, when deep down, we may be hurting.
- B. Learn to quit hiding your sackcloth and be more transparent.
 - 1. (Ecclesiastes 4:9).
 - 2. (Galatians 6:2).
- C. Look deeper and be available to people.
 - 1. How do we respond? "If there's anything we can do, let us know."
 - 2. (Luke 10:30-36) Bandaged his wounds, put him on his donkey, took care of him, paid for his recovery.

Conclusion:

- 1. Let's be the church that God envisioned.
- 2. Let's realize that there are people who are wearing sackcloth underneath and minister to each other.
- 3. Let's not hide our sackcloth and suffer in silence but seek help and support, and in so doing, fulfill the law of Christ (Galatians 6:2).
