The Gardener

(Luke 13:6-9)

Introduction: 1. Jesus appears to people in many ways.

- a. To some, he is a Shepherd.
- b. To some, he is a Deliverer.
- c. To others, he is the Captain of God's army.
- 2. In this lesson, let's think of Jesus in a way that maybe we seldom have.
- 3. Upon his resurrection, Mary Magdalene mistook Jesus for a gardener (John 20:14-16).
- 4. Again, in Luke 13:6-9, Jesus is portrayed as a gardener in the parable of the barren fig tree.
- 5. Note these three lessons from this parable.

I. There is an Expectation

- A. (Luke 13:6-7).
- B. God expects us to bear fruit.
- C. Are we bearing fruit, or are we disappointing God?
- D. Our relationship to God is more than just about "salvation." It's also about "discipleship."

II. There is Patience

- A. (Luke 13:8-9).
- B. Jesus is working on our behalf.
- C. He hasn't given up.
- D. He appeals for more time but is resigned to the knowledge that there is an end to the Father's patience.

III. There is Accountability

- A. (Luke 13:9).
- B. It is not beyond the owner of the vineyard to cut the tree down.
- c. There is an end or limit to God's patience.

Conclusion:

- 1. Aren't you thankful that we have a "Gardener" who shows patience and works with us to bring us to maturity?
- 2. Also, consider how sad it will someday for Jesus to finally acknowledge nothing more can be done.
- 3. Maybe today, Jesus is working in your life, and is desperately seeking a sign of growth.
- 4. Friends, the clock is ticking, and the day of accountability will be upon us.
- 5. What will the Lord find in your life?
