The One Who Lifts Up My Head

(Psalm 3:1-4)

Introduction: 1. Have you ever done something that has caused such shame that you couldn't even look someone in the eyes?

- 2. Have you ever felt so ashamed of your sins that you are even reluctant to approach God in prayer, seeking forgiveness?
- 3. In Psalm 3, David is dejected and discouraged.
- 4. Let's consider three points from this passage.

I. The Accusation

- A. (Psalm 3:1-2)
- B. The troubles of which David speaks has to do with the rebellion of his son, Absalom (2 Samuel 15-17).
- C. David seems taken back and hurt by the size of the rebellion.
- D. Some of those who rebelled were among whom he considered to be his friends.
- E. They were saying of David that not even God would help him (v.2).
 - 1. This is the lie of the enemy!
 - 2. (Psalm 145:18-20; Isaiah 65:24).

II. The Assurance

- A. (Psalm 3:3).
- B. God is a shield for me (round about) me.
 - Covered on all sides.
 - 2. Remember, some of David's enemies were his friends.
- C. David glories in God, not in self.
 - 1. (1 Corinthians 15:10).
 - 2. We need to glorify God (Eph. 3:21).
- D. God lifts up our heads!
 - 1. (Luke 22:31-34, 54-62; Mark 16:7; John 21:15-19).
 - 2. (Acts 9:1-6; 1 Timothy 1:15-16).

III. The Attendance

- A. (Psalm 3:4).
- B. David prayed to God and God heard his prayer.
- C. (Psalm 50:15) "Call upon me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you shall glorify me."

Conclusion:

- 1. We sing it Grace, grace, God's grace, Grace that will pardon and cleanse within; Grace, grace, God's grace, Grace that is greater than all our sin.
- 2. Now, will we believe it.
- 3. Let God lift up your head, and glory in his love for you.
