Forbidden Fruit

Gossip

Introduction: 1. In Genesis 3, we read of the temptation and fall of Adam and Eve.

- 2. The fall of mankind was as a result of partaking of "forbidden fruit."
- 3. The nature of that fruit doesn't really matter, what matters are the consequences.
- 4. It's easy to look at that event and be critical of Eve's decision, however...
 - a. She had never actually heard God give the command not to eat.
 - b. Satan twisted God's word.
 - c. Then he flat out lied to her, making grand promises to her.
- 5. Before we come down too hard on Eve, maybe we ought to consider our own struggles with "forbidden fruit."
- 6. In tonight's lesson we will examine the forbidden fruit of gossip.

I. What the Bible Says About Gossip

- A. (Proverbs 20:19)
- B. (Proverbs 6:19) He who sows discord among brethren.
- C. (2 Thessalonians 3:6-14).
- D. (James 3:8) No one can tame, but it must be bridled.
- E. (Matthew 5:9) Blessed are the peacemakers.
- F. (Romans 10:9) Abhor that which is evil.
 - 1. Easy to find 100 people who love God.
 - 2. Harder to find 100 people who hate sin.
 - 3. We need to learn to hate sin and quit treating some sins like a joke.
 - a. Someone has said that Christians don't gossip, they share prayer requests.
 - b. This sort of light-hearted talk it totally inappropriate.
 - 3. We must determine to take this sin, this forbidden fruit, seriously.

II. How To Avoid This Forbidden Fruit

- A. Understand what gossip is.
 - 1. Gossip can be true; it need not be a lie.
 - 2. The question is not of truthfulness, but of helpfulness.
 - 3. (Proverbs 17:9) Whoever covers an offense seeks love, but whoever repeats a matter separates friends.
 - 4. Saying, "Bless his heart" doesn't excuse what you say.
- B. Think before you speak.
 - 1. (James 1:19).
 - 2. Impact on your children, neighbors, spouses, etc.
- C. Refuse to participate.
 - 1. (1 Timothy 5:19).
 - a. This passage is not condemning making an accusation against an

elder.

- b. It is condemning the act of receiving an accusation against an elder.
- c. It takes two to gossip.
- d. We could shut down gossip immediately if we would simply say, "I don't want to hear this."
 - 1. Not only would it shut it down this time, it would probably break a "gossiper" from ever coming to you with their gossip again.

Conclusion:

- 1. After hearing all of this, is it ever right to talk about other people?
- 2. Certainly.
 - a. We can talk about other people's lives, but when it turns to matters that would cause another to think less of them, we should stop.
 - b. Except in the case that the person you are sharing this information with is someone who can help them.
 - c. We will know the difference if we're honest with ourselves.
- 3. Wouldn't it be great if we would talk less about others and more about Jesus?
