Prayer: Does it Make a Difference?

(Matthew 7:7-11)

Introduction: 1. Many of us would probably admit to feeling inadequate concerning our prayer life.

- 2. While there may be several reasons for that, one reason may be that we fail to see God as a Father.
- 3. I believe that regaining that perspective would help us communicate more frequently in prayer and receive the help that we so often need.
- 4. Let's consider how prayer is impacted when we remember that God is our Father.

I. God Will Not Begrudge Our Prayers.

- A. To "begrudge" means to give reluctantly or resentfully.
 - 1. If I ever needed help, my father would be my best chance at receiving it.
 - 2. Likewise, if my children ever need help, I will do whatever I can within my power to help them.
- B. (Matthew 7:7-8).
- C. God is not our adversary.
 - 1. Sometimes we grow weary of asking and listening, but God does not.
 - 2. Remember, our view of God is not to be shaped by our fathers, but our fathers are to be shaped by the fatherhood of God.
- D. Prayer doesn't overcome God's reluctance but takes hold of his willingness!
- E. (Luke 18:5).
- F. (Isaiah 62:6-7).

II. God Does Not Belittle Our Prayers

III. Why Our Prayers Are Sometimes Unanswered

- A. They may not be asked in faith (James 1:6-7).
- B. We may be sinful when asking (1 Peter 3:12).
- C. We may ask amiss (James 4:3).
- D. We may not ask according to his will (1 John 5:14).
- E. Sometimes our "unanswered" prayers are just delayed (Luke 1:5-13).
