Sinners, Jesus Will Receive

(Luke 9:51-56)

Introduction: 1.

- 1. Have you ever witnessed someone take the high-road and in so doing, shame you for your sinful behavior or thoughts?
- 2. This constantly must have been what it was like being a disciple of Jesus.
- 3. But that shouldn't change for the 21st century disciples of Jesus.
- 4. Just as our early brothers were shamed and corrected, so should we be today.
- 5. Let's examine one such example from Luke 9:51-56.

I. The Pursuit of Jesus

- A. (Luke 9:51).
- B. Jesus "set his face" to go to Jerusalem.
- C. Jesus was in pursuit of a goal with his life and he never lost his focus.
 - 1. As a child (Luke 2:49).
 - 2. As a man (John 4:34).
 - 3. At his death (John 19:30).
- D. How different would our lives be if we lived with the same focus pursuit and focus Jesus possessed.

II. The Prejudices of Men

- A. (Luke 9:52-54).
- B. The background to the Samaritan/Jewish animosity toward each other.
- C. The Samaritans
 - 1. They would not receive Jesus because he was going to Jerusalem (9:53).
 - 2. Imagine rejecting the Son of God because of your hatred for others.
 - 3. Does it still happen today?
- D. The Disciples (James and John)
 - 1. James and John try to cloak their disdain for the Samaritans by invoking Scripture about Elijah (9:54).
 - 2. They wanted the Samaritans to be put to death.
 - 3. Do disciples today ever use Scripture to sinners with contempt?

III. The Purpose of Jesus

- A. (Luke 9:55-56).
- B. Jesus called their spirituality into question for having such an attitude (9:55).
- C. Jesus' purpose was not to destroy sinners, but to save them (9:56).
- D. What is our attitude when we fight the moral decay seen in our culture?

Conclusion:

- 1. Jesus has always been and will always be a challenge to his followers.
- 2. His perfect life constantly exposes our failures and weaknesses.
- 3. But his holiness should serve as a motivating challenge to those who seek to be like him.
