The Thief on the Cross

(Luke 23:39-42)

Introduction: 1.

- 1. When I say "the cross," who immediately comes to mind?
- 2. Of course, most people would say, "Jesus," but I'm not talking about him, I'm talking about the other guys.
- 3. The cross of Jesus is the central event in human history.
- 4. In this moment the fate of all humanity who ever lived and ever will live was affected.
- 5. Yet is it not strange that this unparalleled event would be cluttered with peripheral information about the deaths of two irrelevant thieves?
- 6. Why waste ink on them, when the most significant event in history is taking place?
- 7. Ills. Of the Wright brothers' telegraph.
- 8. Maybe there is purpose for the information supplied about these thieves, and their deaths aren't as insignificant as we might think.

I. The Third Man Died in Sin – The Limit of God's Love

- A. (Luke 23:39).
- B. This man, even in the face of death, remained hardened.
- C. The "gnashing of teeth" doesn't always mean pain but could also mean anger.
 - 1. (Acts 7:54).
 - 2. (Luke 13:28).
- D. People can become hardened by sin.
 - 1. (Hebrews 3:13).
 - 2. (Ephesians 4:19).
 - 3. (2 Thessalonians 2:10-12).
- E. (Hebrews 9:27).
- F. The impenitent thief on the cross demonstrates for us the limit of God's love.
 - 1. (Matthew 7:13-14, 21-23).
 - 2. (Hebrews 10:26-31).

II. The Second Man Died to Sin – The Scope of God's Love

- A. (Luke 23:40-42).
- B. Can I say this before we discuss what I believe is the real reason this thief's death is recorded...
 - 1. The information God revealed about the penitent thief was not intended to be a polemic platform on whether one should or should not obey the Lord's command to be baptized.
 - 2. I have preached on the "thief on the cross" without mentioning the baptism controversy and have been heavily criticized and attacked.

- 3. But let's go ahead and discuss the thief's salvation.
 - a. (Mark 2:10).
 - b. (Hebrews 9:16-17).
 - c. The reason this thief wasn't baptized is the same reason Adam, Abraham and Moses weren't baptized – they weren't commanded to be.
- C. There is nothing like death to bring a man face to face with eternity and our own mortality.
 - 1. Don't discount "deathbed" repentance.
 - 2. Ills. Of woman in Michigan.
- D. (2 Corinthians 7:10).
- E. (Psalm 51:17).
- F. The death of the penitent thief teaches us the scope of God's love.
 - 1. It is a message to all of us who struggle with guilt for wasting so much of our lives in sin.
 - 2. It speaks to those of us who have waited much too long to surrender our lives to Jesus.
 - 3. It speaks to all who have little more to offer to God than an apology. The thief's cross announces that God is a God of grace and forgiveness!

III. The First Man Died for Sin – The Depth of God's Love

- A. Jesus was not the victim of circumstances, a helpless martyr caught up in a plan gone awry.
- B. He was a willing participant (John 10:17-18).
- C. Jesus was born for this day (Revelation 13:8).
- D. His death was a death to redeem others from the grip of sin (Luke 23:34).
 - 1. (Isaiah 53:6).
 - 2. (2 Corinthians 5:21).
 - 3. (2 Corinthians 8:9).
 - 4. (1 Peter 2:24).
- E. Jesus' death on the cross teaches us the depth of God's love.

Conclusion:

- 1. There has only been one sinless man who ever lived...He alone died for sin.
- 2. That leaves us with only two options.
 - a. We can die to sin and have eternal life in Heaven.
 - b. We can die in sin and suffer eternal condemnation.
- 3. The choice is yours.
