Encounters with Jesus The Pharisees

(Matthew 23:1-39)

Introduction: 1. On two separate occasions, Jesus told his disciples to "beware the leaven of the Pharisees" (Matthew 16:6; Luke 12:1).

- 2. The disciples didn't immediately understand what he meant so he explained it in two separate ways.
 - a. The leaven was the "teaching" of the Pharisees (Matthew 16:12).
 - b. The leaven was the "hypocrisy" of the Pharisees (Luke 12:1).
- 3. Tonight, I would like to examine why Jesus had such stern words for the Pharisees, and then ask ourselves to take inventory.

I. The Pharisees Were Enemies of Jesus

- A. I don't know that Jesus had any greater enemies than the Scribes and Pharisees.
 - 1. They assailed him vehemently and cross-examined him (Luke 11:53-54).
 - 2. They tested him (Matthew 19:3).
 - 3. They plotted against him how they might destroy him (Matthew 12:14).
 - 4. They sought to kill him (John 5:18).
 - 5. They plotted to put him to death (John 11:53).
- B. Jesus never spoke harsher words to any group of people than what is recorded in Matthew 23.

II. Reasons for the Condemnation of the Pharisees

- A. Money -vs- Mercy (Matthew 23:14; Exodus 22:22-24).
- B. Conquests -vs- Converts (Matthew 23:15).
- C. Craftiness -vs- Commitment (Matthew 23:16-22).
- D. Minors -vs- Majors (Matthew 23:23-24).
- E. Show -vs- Spirit (Matthew 23:25-28).
- F. Talk -vs- Truth (Matthew 23:29-36).

Conclusion:

- 1. Friends, the Pharisees serve as an ancient reminder that God can see through our hypocrisy.
- 2. We're not going to "bluff" our way into heaven.
- 3. We must genuinely love the Lord and his church if we want eternal life.
- 4. Let me call you to a renewed zeal with which you serve the Lord.
