The Nazarenes (Mark 6:1-6)

Introduction: 1.

- .. Home. That word holds fond memories for many people.
- 2. It takes you back to your childhood, family, and childhood friends.
- 3. I wonder if Jesus was a little excited to come back home to Nazareth as recorded in Mark 6.
- 4. If he was, his excitement was short-lived.
- 5. Let's read the text and make some applications.

I. The Setting

- A. Jesus brought his disciples to his hometown (Mark 6:1).
- B. While there, Jesus taught in the synagogue (Mark 6:2).
- C. His teaching and power caused the locals to wonder how he came to possess such wisdom and power (Mark 6:3).
- D. They remember Jesus as a local boy and dismissed the possibility that he could be something greater than that (Mark 6:3).
- E. Thus, they were offended by him (Mark 6:3).
- F. Because of their disbelief, he only healed a few people (Mark 6:5).
- G. Then the text says, "He marveled because of their unbelief" and left (Mark 6:6).

II. Lessons to Learn

- A. There is no excuse for unbelief (Romans 1:20).
 - 1. Jesus came to Nazareth with an established reputation of mighty works, and did some in their presence, but they were unmoved.
 - 2. Skepticism even causes God to "scratch his head."
 - 3. If that is true then, how much more is it true today?
- B. Familiarity can breed disrespect.
 - 1. Master your pride and give a fair hearing to people, especially when it has to do with our salvation
 - 2. (James 1:17).
- C. There comes a time to move on.
 - 1. We can't make people be saved.
 - 2. At times it is heartbreaking, but no one was more brokenhearted than Jesus, when he walked away from his friends and hometown neighbors, but more than that, his creation.
 - 3. (Matthew 10:14; Matthew 7:6).

Conclusion:

- 1. Friends, you need to make a decision about Jesus.
- 2. There's no excuse for disbelief.
- 3. Others can't make you, but you will have to own your own decision and answer before God someday.
