The Would-Be Disciples

(Luke 9:57-62)

Introduction: 1. Have you ever experienced a "fine-print" problem, only to be disappointed and feel taken advantage of?

- 2. What this passage teaches us is that Jesus doesn't communicate to us in "fine-print."
- 3. Jesus is straightforward and wants you to know exactly what is required and what to expect in becoming his disciple.
- 4. The passage we're discussing today may sound a bit harsh, but remember...
 - a. We may not be acquainted with customs of that day.
 - b. Jesus could read the hearts of these men.
 - c. Jesus was going to battle, and he didn't need fainthearted disciples.
- 5. What I would like to accomplish in this lesson is to take the "edge" off of Jesus' words but preserve the rigorous demands of total commitment.

I. The Impulsive Would-Be Disciple

- A. (Luke 9:57-58).
- B. What an offer!
 - 1. I will follow.
 - 2. I will follow anywhere.
 - 3. This offer came from one who was a Scribe (Matthew 8:19).
- C. However, Jesus looking into his heart knew that he didn't grasp the significance of his words.
 - 1. He had probably seen large crowds, miracles, and enthusiasm, but had not considered self-denial, sacrifice, and suffering.
 - 2. Ills. Earnest T. Bass wanting a uniform.
- D. Notice that Jesus neither accepted or rejected this man's offer, but left it for him to make a decision upon the facts.
- E. He was telling him to "count the cost."

II. The Indecisive Would-Be Disciple

- A. (Luke 9:59-60).
- B. The first would-be disciple volunteers, but this one had to be asked "Follow me."
- C. Jesus' response to this would-be disciple seems harsh but consider some of these factors that may soften the harshness.
 - 1. Though burials usually occurred the same day, the other funeral activities lasted for more than a week.

- 2. There is nothing in the text that actually states that the father has died. His response could be a delay tactic an excuse.
- 3. Remember, Jesus knew the hearts of men and could cut through what we could not know.
- D. The sad word of this would-be disciples was "first." First, let me go... (Matthew. 6:33).
- E. No matter what stage in life we may find ourselves, there are always excuses.

III. The Indefinite Would-Be Disciple

- A. (Luke 9:61-62).
- B. Again, the request seems reasonable, but consider.
 - 1. In Eastern countries, "goodbyes" could literally take months.
 - 2. Furthermore, what influence could be exerted upon him to change his mind?
- C. Ills. of woman in Honduras.
- D. Jesus again, knowing his heart, tells him he can't go back.

Conclusion:

- 1. What do we learn from this short encounter with Jesus?
 - a. Count the cost.
 - b. Jesus must come first.
 - c. There can be no looking back.
- 2. These truths are just as applicable today as they were when Jesus first spoke them.
- 3. What about you? Will you follow Jesus?
