Jesus: His Birth

(Matthew 1:1-25)

Introduction: 1. Last week, we established the identity of Jesus (John 1:1-3,14).

2. In this lesson, we want to examine some of the facts surrounding his entry into this world.

I. Why a Manger?

- A. Consider the nearly infinite ways at the disposal of God to bring Jesus into the world.
- B. God chose a baby in a manger.
- C. The thought of the Creator of the Universe being a helpless infant who had to grow and learn like all of us is amazing (Luke 2:52).
- D. That begs the question, "why?"
- E. While God does not explicitly answer that question, can we partially answer by way of inference?
 - 1. It was a demonstration of humility (Philippians 2:5-8).
 - 2. He subjected himself to dependency (He was fully human Mt. 16:13).
 - 3. It's a display of God's wisdom and power (1 Corinthians 1:20-25).

II. Why There and Then?

- A. (Galatians 4:4).
- B. Why was the first century Judea and Galilee the right place and time to bring Jesus into this world.
- C. Again, while the answer is not explicitly given, we can partially answer by observation.
 - 1. The Jewish dispersion and hope of a coming Messiah.
 - 2. Synagogue development and reading of Scripture.
 - 3. Septuagint Greek translation of the Hebrew Scriptures 280 B.C.
 - 4. Aristotle and logical thinking.
 - 5. Roads "All roads lead to Rome."
 - 6. "Pax Romana" Peace of Rome.
 - 7. Receptiveness of the people.

Conclusion:

- 1. The birth of Jesus was the beginning of the end of God's great scheme of redemption.
- 2. From the foundation of the world (Revelation 13:8), God was overseeing and manipulating world events to bring us to this point in time.
- 3. Should we not feel humbled and grateful to be the objects of God's love and concern?
- 4. Jesus said that we express our love to him by obeying him (John 14:15).
