Introduction: 1.

- 1. Wouldn't you like to know more about Jesus and his boyhood?
- 2. God saw fit to only record his birth, and the next time we see him, he is 12 years old.
- 3. In this lesson, I want to demonstrate how focused Jesus was, and encourage us to follow his example.

I. The Incarnation of Jesus

- A. There is a great mystery in the incarnation of Jesus.
- B. Incarnation simply means that God became flesh in the person of Jesus.
- C. (Luke 2:52).
- D. (Philippians 2:5-8).
- E. Ills. 1851, John Everett Millais painting, "Christ in the House of His Parents."

II. The Focus of Jesus

- A. As a boy.
 - 1. (Luke 2:41-52).
 - 2. Two questions about this account.
 - a. Why would Jesus worry his parents as he did?
 - b. Why would Jesus speak to his mother in what seems to be such a dismissive fashion?
 - 3. What we do know is that by the age of 12, he was aware of his mission.
- B. In his ministry.
 - 1. (John 4:34) My food is to do the will of him who sent me and to finish his work.
 - 2. (John 6:38) I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will, but the will of him who sent me.
- C. At his death.
 - 1. (John 19:30).
 - 2. Jesus' dying words revealed his focus.

Conclusion:

- 1. The point of this lesson is not simply historical.
- 2. The point is to challenge all of us to follow Jesus' in this aspect of life as well as the others.
- 3. We need greater focus.
 - a. We spend too much time thinking about temporal things and not enough on spiritual things.
 - b. We spend more thought planning vacations than we do preparing for our meeting with God.
- 4. These things must change for our good and for the good of the world.
