(Matthew 16:13-16)

Introduction: 1. As John closes his gospel account stating why he wrote it (John 20:30-31).

- 2. The question of Jesus' identity is not a new question.
 - a. (Matthew 21:10) Jerusalem.
 - b. (Luke 5:21) The Scribes and Pharisees.
 - c. (Luke 7:49) Those dining with Jesus.
 - d. (Luke 9:9) Herod.
 - e. (John 5:12) The Jews.
 - f. (Matthew 16:13-16) Jesus asked his disciples.
- 3. The answer to this question, concerning the identity of Jesus, is central to one's salvation.
- 4. Thus, John begins immediately in his gospel account with the answer.

I. Jesus is the Word

- A. (John 1:1,14; 1 John 1:1).
- B. Why refer to Jesus as the "Word?"
 - 1. Words are used to communicate.
 - 2. God communicated to us through Jesus (Hebrews 1:1-2).

II. Jesus is God

- A. (John 1:1).
- B. Jesus was more than a good man, or prophet; he was God in the flesh (John 1:14).
- C. Trilemma Jesus was either a liar, lunatic, or Lord.
- D. (John 8:56-58).

III. Jesus is the Creator

- A. (John 1:3).
- B. (Colossians 1:15; Hebrews 1:2).
- C. Just as cooperation existed among the Godhead in redemption, so it existed in the creation.
 - 1. God the Father appointed (Hebrews 11:1-2).
 - 2. God the Son created it (Gen. 1:1; John 1:3; Col. 1:15; Heb. 1:2).
 - 3. God the Holy Spirit garnished it (Job 26:13).

IV. Jesus is The Savior

- A. (John 1:12).
- B. (John 1:29).
