- 3. The prophets were great and godly men; men who could not be silenced by bribery or threat.
- 5. (Matthew 16:13-15) What a great compliment to the prophets!
- 6. But then we come to Jonah. He is an ignigma.
- 7. I wish I knew "the rest of the story," but I don't, so I would like for us to learn some lessons from what we do know.

I. The Book is About a Great God, not a Great Fish

- A. I know it's hard not to be captivated by the miracle of the great fish, but what is greater than that is God's love for people.
- B. God isn't sitting in heaven, waiting for opportunities to zap us.
- C. He wants all men everywhere to repent (2 Peter 3:10).
- D. This character trait of God is so uncommon among men (Matt. 5:44).

II. All Men Are Accountable to God

- A. (Jonah 1:2).
- B. Just because the Gentiles did not have the law of Moses doesn't mean they were not accountable to God.
- C. Nor does it mean that God did not love them.

III. We All Run

- A. The question is whether we will run with God or run from God.

IV. Sin Isn't Personal or Private

- A. Sin, almost always, involves others.
- B. (Jonah 1:12-14).
- C. (Romans 14:7).

- C. How many times have we had to ask God for forgiveness for the same thing?
