Parables of Grace Forgiving Grace: The Unforgiving Servant

(Matthew 18:21-35)

Introduction: 1. Forgiveness is an interesting thing. It's something we all want but it's also something we struggle giving to others.

- 2. Everyone here is aware of your need for forgiveness.
- 3. However, is there someone in your life you are unwilling to forgive?
- 4. When I say, "unwilling to forgive," I'm talking about a person who has repented and asked for your forgiveness.
- 5. If so, this parable speaks to you.

I. Recounting the Parable

- A. (Matthew 18:21-35).
- B. This parable is spoken in response to Peter's statement (Matthew 18:21; Amos 1-2).
- C. In this parable, two men are debtors, one is forgiven a great sum of money, yet he was unwilling to forgive another who owed a small amount of money.
- D. Because of this his debt was reinstated and his forgiveness was repealed.

II. Lessons from the Parable

- A. We Need a Balanced View of God.
 - 1. Many love to speak of how God is rich in mercy (Psalm 136; 103:1-14).
 - 2. But we learn more about God's character in this passage.
 - 3. The same God who is rich in forgiveness is demanding of those who will not forgive (Matthew 18:43-35).
 - 4. (Romans 11:22).
 - 5. We need to renounce the God we have fashioned to our liking, and embrace the true God as revealed in Scripture (Numbers 14:18).
- B. We must forgive to be forgiven.
 - 1. (Matthew 18:34-35).
 - 2. (James 2:13).
 - 3. In response to the grace that has been extended to us, there can only be one righteous response to those who seek our forgiveness.
- Conclusion: 1. This parable reminds me of the graciousness of God.
 - 2. It also reminds me that the greatest thing I can do for myself is to forgive those who seek forgiveness.
