Parables of Grace

Generous Grace: The Workers in the Vineyard

(Matthew 20:1-16)

- Introduction: 1. Ills. of School President who wants to take his teachers on a trip to the "Holy Land."
 - a. Would you be praising the President for his graciousness?
 - b. Or would you be crying, "That's not fair!?"
 - 2. The parable in Matthew 20:1-16, is identical in principle. The situation is different, but the desired takeaway is the same.
 - 3. Let's study this parable together.

I. Recounting the Parable

- A. (Matthew 20:1-16).
- B. A landowner hired several workers to help him in his vineyard.
- C. He paid them according to "what is right" (20:4), but gave the one's who worked the least the same amount as those who had worked all day.
- D. This made the early workers complain about their wages.

II. Responding to the Parable

- A. If you put yourself in the parable, would you be...
 - 1. Praising the graciousness of the landowner.
 - 2. Or, crying "Foul," "That's not fair?"
- B. The way the landowner handed out the wages seems intentional.
 - 1. He could have reversed the order and had no complaint.
 - 2. But instead, he did it in a way that invited complaint, but exposed the hearts of the workers.
 - 3. We don't know their response but are left to wonder how we would have responded.
- C. We should rejoice in the good fortune of others.
 - 1. I hope that is how these workers (or I) would respond to the landowners explanation.
 - 2. Grace is not only "amazing," but it can also be "infuriating."
 - 3. This is not an issue of unfairness, but graciousness.
- D. When we compare what we have with what others have, we usually become discontent and unthankful.

Conclusion:

- 1. Maybe this parable, instead of being called, "The Parable of the Workers in the Vineyard," would be better name, "The Parable of the Generous Landowner."
- 2. Let us learn to rejoice over God's graciousness, for a gracious God is good news to us, for we all need grace.
