Parables of Grace The Joy of Grace: The Lost Sheep & Coin

(Luke 15:1-10)

Introduction: 1. Have you ever lost something, then felt tremendous relief and joy upon finding it?

- a. Ills. of Kelli.
- b. Ills. of Matthew.
- 2. The parables of the Lost Sheep and Lost Coin remind us of God's joy over reclaiming the lost.
- 3. Let's consider these two parables and what we can learn from them.

I. The Parables

- A. (Luke 15:1-10).
- B. In both parables, something is lost, then found, and great joy resulted.
- C. This parable was spoken to the Pharisees.
 - 1. The Pharisees were considered to be "experts" at the law.
 - 2. Generally speaking, they were mostly portrayed as hypocrites.
- D. When we don't appreciate how much we need grace, we often find it hard to extend it to others.
- E. In this parable, Jesus asks the Pharisees to consider what it would be like to be in the shoes of two people for which they had little respect.
 - 1. Shepherds bottom of society's social ladder.
 - 2. Woman "In all this inferior to the man" Josephus.
- F. He reminds us of God's gracious pursuit of us.

II. Application of the Parable

- A. Jesus found himself among sinners because of their unholiness, while the Pharisees, because of their pursuit for holiness, avoided sinful people.
 - 1. Jesus was called a friend of sinners (Matthew 11:19).
 - 2. Christianity is not a social club of the saved.
 - 3. We need to be seeking the lost (Matthew 28:19-20; John 9:4).
 - 4. We must walk a fine line (1 Corinthians 15:33).
- B. We need to learn to see people as God sees people.
 - 1. (John 3:16).
 - 2. (Romans 5:6-11).
- C. We should express our joy when the lost are saved.
 - 1. Do we encourage new Christians?
 - 2. Or is that someone else's job?
- Conclusion: 1. We should be thankful to God for the Joy of his grace!
