Parables of Grace

Trusting in Grace

(Luke 11:5-13; Luke 18:4-5)

Introduction: 1.

- 1. Today's lesson will bring to a close a series of lessons on several of the parables of Jesus that focused on God's grace.
- 2. Today's lesson will actually introduce two parables of Jesus, both of which teach the same lesson.
- 3. The parables are sometimes called, "The Parable of the Persistent Neighbor," and the "Parable of the Persistent Widow."
- 4. Let's examine together the lesson Jesus wanted to impress upon us by telling us two parables with the same message.

I. The Setting to Both Parables

- A. (Luke 11:5-13).
 - 1. A visitor arrives at a man's house, it is midnight, and he has nothing to serve him after his journey.
 - 2. So he goes to his neighbor's house to ask for bread.
 - 3. The neighbor does not respond favorably, but because he won't go away, the neighbor gives him what he needs.
- B. (Luke 18:1-8).
 - 1. A widow was seeking justice from an adversary, but the judge would not act on behalf of the widow.
 - 2. But because of her persistence, he gave in and avenged her.

II. The Application for us Today

- A. We are reminded of the reality of prayer.
 - 1. God really invites us into his presence to hear our petitions!
 - 2. (Luke 11:1-4).
 - 3. Do you know any President or King with whom, at your desire, can secure a private meeting?
 - 4. But we can with God!
- B. If the ungodly can be moved to do right, how much more is God already inclined to do right?
 - 1. These parables are not saying God is like the neighbor and judge, but he is being contrasted with the neighbor and judge.
 - 2. (Isaiah 62:7; 1 Thessalonians 5:17; James 5:16).

Conclusion:

- 1. Don't miss the question Jesus asks "When the Son of Man comes, will he really find [this] faith on the earth?"
- 2. Question: Is this kind of faith seen in you? Do you believe in prayer? Do you pray like you believe in prayer?
