The Disciple's Faithfulness

(Matthew 5:20-37)

Introduction:

- 1. In this morning's lesson, we noted that Jesus called his disciples to a greater degree of righteousness than what was shown in the Pharisees of his day.
- 2. How faithful we are to that challenge can be demonstrated in the way we live our lives.
- 3. Let's note several ways Jesus mentioned that will demonstrate our faithfulness to an "exceeding righteousness."

I. The Disciple's Faithfulness Can Be Measured By...

- A. How we manage anger (5:21-26).
 - 1. Anger is not necessarily sinful (Mark 3:1-5).
 - 2. There is justifiable anger, but then there's "anger without a cause."
 - 3. Anger can be dealt with by venting, suppressing, or processing the last option is biblical.
 - 4. Our anger will affect our worship as well as our eternal destiny.
- B. How we guard our hearts (5:27-30).
 - 1. Lust is not the same thing as attraction.
 - 2. (Matthew 15:19).
 - 3. Do what is necessary to remove this sin from your life.
 - 4. Pornography is more accessible today than it has ever been.
- C. How we value our marriages (5:31-32).
 - 1. The vows of marriage are to be kept.
 - 2. Society and religious folks say otherwise.
 - 3. But at the heart of the matter is one's faithfulness to God.
 - 4. Fornication is the only ground for scriptural divorce and remarriage.
- D. How we guarantee our words (5:33-37).
 - 1. Honesty was apparently hard to come by, even among religious people (Matthew 23:16-22).
 - 2. We must be men and women of integrity, who tell the truth.
 - 3. One lie will cause 1000 truths to be doubted, and we, who have a message of incomparable importance, need to be believed.
 - 4. (Colossians 3:9).

Conclusion:

- 1. The righteousness that exceeds is determined by change in the inward man.
- 2. However, that inward change cannot be hidden, but will find it's way out in visible forms that all can see.
- 3. If you have not been as faithful as you should be, Jesus offers you forgiveness and invites you to start all over again.
