Put Your Hope In God

(Psalm 42-43)

- Introduction: 1. We have probably all experienced moments when we asked the question, "why?"
 - 2. There are countless situations that have brought us to tears or have caused us to bear a weight that seems too heavy to bear.
 - 3. I'm hear to tell you that while we may have our down moments, life is more than pessimism and despair. There is hope, and there is joy (Romans 12:12).

I. Psalm 42-43

- A. This is a three verse poem that somehow got divided into two Psalms.
- B. There are three stanzas, each followed by the refrain, "Why are you cast down, O my soul? And why are you disquieted within me? Hope in God, for I shall yet praise Him, for the help of my countenance and my God."
- C. The author of this psalm remembers better days when he worshiped at Jerusalem (42:4).
- D. Those days are now only a memory and he is now being taunted (42:3, 10).
- E. The circumstances finally take their toll and he cries out, "Why have you forgotten me?" (42:9).
- F. No doubt many of us have been there.

II. The Key To Survival

- A. Allow your joy and hope rise above your circumstances.
- B. This is what the author of this psalm did.
- C. After all his questions, he finally reaches out to God and puts his hope in him.
- D. This didn't change his circumstances, but what did change was his willingness to trust God with the confusing details of his life.
- E. Now you may understand why we began with the story about the man hwo had forgotten where his home was (Ephesians 2:19; Philippians 3:20).
- F. Three things that can help us while we are away from home.
 - 1. Look beyond your circumstances to your Savior (2 Cor. 5:7).
 - 2. Learn from your mistakes.
 - 3. Pray for God to give you joy in your hope.

Conclusion: 1. I for one, hope the psalmist survived his ordeal.

- 2. And I hope the same for you and me.
- 3. Put your hope in God.
