What Opportunity Looks Like

(John 4:35)

Introduction: 1. When we think of opportunities, we typically think in terms of glorious things that appeal to our pride and our own resources.

- 2. But God opens doors for us that neither appeal to our pride or to our own power.
- 3. Proof of this truth is quickly seen in a survey of the early church.
- 4. Let's take a look.

I. In The Early Church, Opportunity Looked Like A Lame Beggar

- A. (Acts 3:1-4:4).
- B. What many might see as an inconvenience, proved to be the catalyst for many obeying the gospel.

II. In The Early Church, Opportunity Looked Like A Church Problem

- A. (Acts 6:1-7).
- B. There's no trouble like church trouble.
- C. But this church problem resulted in good.

III. In The Early Church, Opportunity Looked Like Persecution

- A. (Acts 8:1-4).
- B. While none would desire persecution, it often results in good.
- C. Because of the persecution, the disciples scattered, taking the gospel with them.

IV. In The Early Church, Opportunity Looked Like Personal Conflict

- A. (Acts 15:36-41).
- B. While some people allow personal conflict to overthrow their faith, Paul and Barnabas didn't.
- C. In fact, it doubled their efforts in teaching the gospel.

V. In The Early Church, Opportunity Looked Like Imprisonment

- A. (Acts 16:20-33).
- B. Paul and Silas were imprisoned for their faith, but it resulted in the conversion of their jailer.

Conclusion: 1. Opportunities come in many shapes and sizes.

- 2. Don't just look to serve in big and glorious ways, rather open your eyes to the small and unlikely ways in which we can serve God.
- 2. Let's take advantage of the opportunities and doors God opens for us.
