Two Men - Two Prayers

(Luke 18:9-14)

Introduction: 1. Jesus addressed the problem of pride in a very brief but powerful parable of a Publican and Pharisee who went up to the temple to pray.

- 2. The challenge of this parable is to find ourselves in this story.
- 3. When we discover our answer, please note what Jesus concluded.

I. Two Men

- A. Pharisee.
 - 1. The most strict sect in Judaism.
 - 2. The term "pharisee" literally means "the separated ones."
 - 3. These were the spiritually elite.
- B. Publican.
 - 1. A publican was a tax collector.
 - 2. Many were unscrupulous and dishonest.
 - 3. Often mentioned together with sinners (Matthew 9:10-11; 11:19; Mark 2:15-16; Luke 5:30; 7:34; Luke 15:1).

II. Two Prayers

- A. Proud
 - 1. Gave thanks for not doing certain things.
 - a. The fact that we may not be guilty of some sins, doesn't make us free from all sin.
 - b. (Romans 3:9-10, 23).
 - c. How do we dare take pride in our avoidance from some sin, while we are guilty of other sins?
 - 2. Gave thanks for doing certain things.
 - a. Do we think that the little good we can do in life can atone for our sinful status?
 - b. (Isaiah 64:6; Luke 17:10).
 - d. "What can wash away my sins? Nothing but the blood of Jesus. Not of good that I have done. Nothing but the blood of Jesus."
- B. Humble
 - 1. (Isaiah 6:5).
 - 2. (1 John 1:9).

Conclusion: 1. Two men; two prayers, but only one man went home justified.

- 2. Attitude made the difference.
- 3. When you approach the God of heaven, do you do so with pride or with humility and brokenness?
- 4. (Psalm 51:17).
