- 2. This narrative can teach us several practical lessons.
- 3. Therefore, let's examine the story and see what application can be made to our lives today.

I. The Story Itself

- A. (Luke 17:11-19).
- B. Ten lepers met Jesus from a distance.
- C. They lifted their voices and cried out to him for mercy.
- D. Jesus told them to go show themselves to the priest.
- E. When they saw that they had been healed, only one leper returned.
- F. Of the lepers who returned, the only one who did return to give thanks was a Samaritan.

II. Practical Lessons We Can Learn From This Account

- A. We All Have A Deadly Problem Like These Lepers.
 - 1. (Romans 3:10, 23; 6:23).
- B. We Must Admit Our Problem & Cry Out For Help.
 - 1. (Luke 17:13).
 - 2. Life and death matters trump formality and etiquette.
 - 3. If you know you have a problem, will you cry out for help?
 - 4. (James 4:10).
 - 5. Don't let pride stand in the way of your salvation.
- C. God's Power Is Not Given Until We Act In Faith.
 - 1. (Luke 17:14).
 - 2. Note that they weren't healed, then went; but rather they went and were healed.
 - 3. (Hebrews 11:30).
- D. God Expects Thanks.
 - 1. (Luke 17:17).
 - 2. (Hebrews 13:15).
- E. Those Who Are Closer To God Are Not Always Who You Would Expect.
 - 1. (Luke 17:16) He was a Samaritan.
 - 2. (Luke 18:10-14).
 - 3. (1 Corinthians 1:26).
