THE JUDGMENT THAT MATTERS

(1 Corinthians 4:1-5)

Introduction: 1.

- 1. I believe that most of us realize that our lives are going to be judged.
- 2. Judgment of our lives takes place many times.
 - a. Sometimes justice prevails—sometimes it doesn't.
- 3. In this passage, Paul brings to our attention at least three judgments that we will undergo as Christians.
- 4. In this lesson, let us examine these three judgments that will be made concerning our lives.

I. The Court Of Public Opinion

- A. (1 Corinthians 4:1-3).
- B. Often times, people will incorrectly judge us concerning our actions and our motives.
 - 1. (1 Samuel 17:28) David misjudged by his brother.
 - 2. (1 Kings 18:17) Ahab misjudged Elijah.
 - 3. (Mark 3:21) Jesus' own family misjudged Him as being mad.
 - 4. (2 Corinthians 10:10-11) Paul was misjudged by some of his own converts.
- C. (Luke 6:26) If we have no enemies, we're doing something wrong.

II. The Court Of Personal Opinion

- A. (1 Corinthians 4:3-4).
- B. How we think or feel about ourselves is not a safe guide.
 - 1. (Proverbs 28:26) A fool trusts in his own heart.
 - 2. (2 Corinthians 10:12) Measuring yourself by yourself is not wise.
 - 3. (Acts 23:1) Paul live in good conscience while persecuting the church.

III. The Court Of Divine Opinion

- A. (1 Corinthians 4:4-5).
- B. God's judgment is infallible (Genesis 18:25).
- C. God's judgment is thorough (2 Corinthians 5:10).
- D. God's judgment is penetrating (Ecclesiastes 12:14).

- 2. While we should be concerned about all three courts—only the judgment of God really matters.
