To Judge Or Not To Judge?

(Matthew 7:1-5)

- Introduction: 1. Matthew 7:1 just may be the most quoted passage in all the Bible and possibly one of the most misunderstood.
 - 2. There are at least two difficulties we must be careful to avoid when judging others.
 - a. Quick, unfair evaluations.
 - b. The tendency to hold others to a more strict standard than ourselves.
 - 3. Let's look at what the Bible says about judging.

I. Some Judgment Is Commanded

- A. Matthew 7 is not an end-all pronouncement on the subject of judging.
- B. (John 4:24) We are commanded to judge.
- C. (1 Thessalonians 5:21) We must judge between what is good and bad.
- D. (Matthew 7:16) We identify false teachers by identifying their fruit.
- E. (Matthew 7:6) We must be able to identify a "swine" and a "dog."

II. How To Avoid The Wrong Kind Of Judgment

- A. Examine yourself first & Don't Be Hypocritical.
 - 1. (Matthew 7:5).
 - 2. (2 Corinthians 13:5; Romans 2:1-4).
 - 3. For some reason, our sin never seems quite as bad as someone else's sin.
- B. Get The Facts & Don't Rush To Judgment.
 - 1. According the U.S. law, a man is innocent until proven guilty.
 - 2. The same is true with God's law (1 Corinthians 13:7).
 - 3. (James 1:19).
- C. Show Mercy.
 - 1. (Matthew 7:2).
 - 2. (Matthew 5:7; James 2:13).
- D. Deal As Privately As Possible.
 - 1. (Matthew 18:15).

Conclusion: 1. What kind of judging do you do?

- 2. You can't cop out by saying you don't judge, because you do, and in fact you're commanded to judge.
- 3. Remember that Jesus didn't condemn judging, he condemned critical, rash, hypocritical judging.
