## GRACE IN A BARREN PLACE (II SAMUEL 9)

## Introduction: 1. One of the most misunderstood and oft mentioned concepts in all the Bible is *"grace"*.

- 2. It has been virtually ignored by some and overemphasized by others.
- 3. I don't know of many pictures that better illustrate God's grace than from a situation in the life of David.
- 4. From this text, we may describe grace as being snatched from a barren place from a dry and desolate life of sin only to be seated at the table of the king. It is undeserved and unrepayable.
- 5. Allow me to set out to justify such a definition of grace.

## I. David And Mephibosheth

- A. It was common in Eastern dynasties for a new king to kill every member of the predecessor's family.
  - 1. When Jonathan heard that David would succeed his father, he asked him to spare his descendants.
  - 2. David promised that he would protect Jonathan's family (I Sam. 20:13-16; 24:21-22)
- B. In an effort to extend grace, David asked "Is there not yet anyone of the house of Saul to whom I may show the kindness of God?" (II Sam. 9:3).
  - 1. Note that David said "anyone", not just the worthy or deserving.
- C. The answer to David's question is, "There is still a son of Jonathan who is crippled in both feet." (II Samuel 9:3).
  - 1. There may be a hint of caution due to his handicap.
- D. David sends for Mephibosheth (II Sam. 9:5).
  - 1. For Mephibosheth, this must have been terrifying (II Samuel 9:6-7).
- E. David lavished gifts upon Mephibosheth.
  - 1. All that had formerly belonged to Saul was given to Mephibosheth.
  - 2. Mephibosheth was given a place a the king's table.

## II. Lessons In Grace From David And Mephibosheth

- A. Mephibosheth once knew what it was like to enjoy fellowship with the king, and so did mankind with the King of kings.
  - 1. (Isaiah 59:1-2).
- B. Mephibosheth suffered a fall that crippled him just as we have all been crippled by our fall in sin (Romans 6:23; 3:23).
- C. Mephibosheth had nothing, deserved nothing, and in fact, didn't even try to win the king's favor (Ephesians 2:8-9; Romans 5:6-8).
- D. Mephibosheth was "adopted" into the king's family (Ephesians 1:5; I John 3:1).
- E. Mephibosheth's crippled feet were constant reminders of grace (Psalms 103:10-14).

Conclusion: 1. Will you accept God's wonderful grace through your obedient faith in Jesus.
