GIVE THANKS!

(I Thessalonians 5:18)

- Introduction: 1. I suppose that potentially, one of the churches greatest shames is ingratitude.
 - 2. To have so much, and not give thanks is a repulsive sight.
 - 3. (II Thessalonians 2:13) Paul was "bound" to always give thanks to God.
 - 4. (I Thessalonians 5:18) "In everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."
 - 5. This lesson is designed to remind you of just a few reasons you ought always give thanks to God.

I. WE HAVE BEEN MADE IN THE IMAGE OF GOD

- A. (Genesis 1:26-27).
- B. Is it not good news to know that you will survive the death of your body?
- C. Aren't you thankful that everlasting life has been extended to you?
- D. (I Peter 1:4) We have an inheritance reserved in heaven.
- E. Being made in the image of God, and by trusting in the One God sent, I can be released from the fear of death (Hebrews 2:14-15).

II. JESUS CARES FOR US

- A. It is a terrible feeling to think that nobody cares for you, and many suffer in this loneliness.
- B. But as a Christian, while we may have our moments of discouragement, we can never truthfully say, "Nobody cares about me."
- C. (I Peter 5:7).
- D. (Hebrews 4:15).
- E. Are we not blessed to have such a Savior?

III. JESUS IS OUR JUSTIFIER

- A. In a sense, when we obeyed the gospel, Jesus no longer stood as our Judge, but He became our Justifier.
- B. (Revelation 12:10) Satan is the accuser of the brethren.
- C. But to whom does He bring his accusations? God, who is our Justifier.
- D. (Romans 8:31-34).
- E. With Jesus as my justifier, Satan cannot win.

IV. JESUS IS OUR PROPITIATION

- A. (I John 2:1) The word propitiation means to "regain the favor of; reconciliation."
- B. (Romans 4:7-8) Our sins are covered.
- C. Is not the fact that Jesus has clothed (covered) our lives with garments of righteousness, holiness, and purity reason to be thankful?

Conclusion: 1. We have much for which to be thankful, if we are Christians.

- 2. Let us remember to maintain that disposition.
- 3. Matthew Henry, an esteemed Bible scholar was once robbed, prompting him to enter the following into his daily diary: "Let me be thankful first, because he never robbed me before; second, because although he took my purse, he did not take my life; third, because although he took all I possessed, it was not much; and fourth, because it was I who was robbed, and not I who robbed."
