If I Had Two Wishes...

(Proverbs 30:5-9)

- Introduction: 1. From Aladdin's lamp to Barbara Eden in "I dream of Jeannie," we've all probably day dreamed about having several wishes granted.
 - 2. If you had two wishes, just what would you wish for?
 - 3. Also, do you think that your wishes would tell us anything about yourself... your character, what's important to you, etc.?
 - 4. In the book of Proverbs, one man makes two wishes that I think tell us a great deal about this man's life.

I. Wish Number One – Integrity and Honesty

- A. (Proverbs 30:8).
- B. We live in a society that is noticeably lacking in integrity.
- C. Lying has become so common place...so easy.
- D. We lie to our spouses, our children, our parents, at school, at work, to friends, to preachers, to elders, and even to ourselves.
- E. There are consequences to lying (Proverbs 6:19; 19:5; Revelation 21:8).
- F. Lies are so easy to tell, so hard to live, and so damaging to our souls.
- G. Let us strive against the current of society and be men and women of integrity.

II. Wish Number Two – A God Honoring Life

- A. (Proverbs 20:8-9).
- B. Maybe we could go with half of Agur's second wish "don't give me poverty."
- C. But the second part of the wish must be a joke. Who in their right mind would wish "don't make me rich?"
- D. There is nothing inherently wrong about poverty or wealth, but Agur was acutely aware of the problems that accompany both poverty and wealth and wished to avoid them.
- E. Above all, he simply wants to faithfully honor and serve God with his life.

Conclusion: 1. Of course, we all know that there is no genie in a bottle, no lamp that we can rub, but there is an almighty God in heaven.

- 2. This God is a God who has promised to give us those good things for which we ask.
- 3. So my advice to you today would be to ask, and to ask wisely. To ask for things that will result in a life that is lived to the honor and glory of God.
