"Salvation: Can It Be Forfeited?"

- Introduction: 1. The doctrine of "Once Saved, Always Saved" is a major tenant of Calvinistic doctrine, and is held as true by many major religious denominations today.
 - 2. However, we find ourselves in opposition to this doctrine, not because of tradition, but because of the convictions we have drawn from reading and studying the Scriptures.
 - 3. If there was ever a doctrine that I could "want" to be true, I suppose this one would be it, but wanting a thing to be true doesn't make it true.
 - 4. It is our goal in this lesson to examine what the Scriptures teach in regard to the question, "Can one fall from grace?"

I. Passages Teaching One Can Fall From Grace

- A. I don't know if I know a single doctrine that is repudiated as often through Scripture as this doctrine of "once saved, always saved."
- B. (Romans 8:12-13).
- C. (Revelation 3:1-5).
- D. (James 5:19-20).
- E. (1 Corinthians 9:27; 10:12).
- F. (Hebrews 3:12).
- G. (Hebrews 10:26-27).
- H. (Galatians 5:1-4).
- I. Dozens of Conditional passages (1 John 1:7; 1 Cor. 15:2; Col. 1:22-23).

II. Objections Considered

- A. Where you fall ("falling in" -vs- "falling away from").
 - 1. (1 Corinthians 10:12).
 - 2. (Galatians 5:4) One can fall "from" grace.
- B. (John 10:27-30)
 - 1. Eternal Life (Given in promise e.g. Joshua 6:1-2).
 - 2. No one can snatch them away (however, one can remove himself e.g. Gal. 1:6).

Conclusion: 1. There is indeed, security in Christ Jesus (1 John 1:7), but that security is dependent upon our faith and conduct.

- 2. While the doctrine of "once saved, always saved" is a false doctrine, so is the doctrine of "once saved, barely saved." There is great security in Christ (2 Peter 1:11; 1 John 1:7).
- 3. If you walk in the light, you can be assured of security; if you walk in darkness, regardless of a former profession of faith or baptism, you have no security; only a fearful expectation of judgment.
